## **New Pedestrian Overhead Walkway**

**By Deborah Marshall, Director Media Relations BC Ferries.**

Construction on a new pedestrian overhead walkway at BC Ferries' Horseshoe Bay Terminal will begin this fall in order to improve safety as well as access to the Village.

It will provide stair and elevator access from the Nanaimo bound holding compound to an elevated walkway over the exit lanes and will connect into the existing walkway to the ticketing and administration building. This structure will be similar to the overhead walkway connecting the Langdale bound compound to the walkway system.

"Currently many customers access the Village at ground level across the exit lanes, which has been a longstanding safety concern for us," said Jason Bowman, BC Ferries' Regional Director of Terminal Operations. "The new overhead walkway will improve safety by separating pedestrians and vehicular traffic and will enhance customer service by offering more convenient access to all the shops and amenities available in Horseshoe Bay."

Because the walkway structure will be pre-fabricated, disruption during the construction should be minimal. One of the four exit lanes will be closed periodically during the project. BC Ferries is conducting this work outside of the peak season and the project is expected to be completed by March 2011.

The Horseshoe Bay overhead walkway is one of 21 government stimulus projects announced in mid-August by the federal and provincial governments.

**Looking back, the "Save Eagleridge Bluffs" story.**

West Vancouverites have a history of coming together to challenge strongly held community beliefs. The Bluffs campaign added to that history, with the spirit of local people coming together for a cause in which they truly believed. In the words of Margaret Mead, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has".

The Bluffs campaign was covered in detail in this newsletter, and though community activists fought a gallant fight, the campaign seemed doomed from the outset by powers beyond the protesters control. One protester involved in writing a collaborative book about the Bluffs protest suggests that what happened at Eagleridge echoes what has happened at all of BC's world renowned blockades (Clayoquot Sound, South Moresby, the Elaho and Walbran valleys) since the 1980's. "There are many disturbing aspects of how public protest is handled in BC, but perhaps most disturbing in public land disputes is the courts involvement in bending the intent of the law to end these protests without ever questioning whether governments have undertaken 'meaningful' consultation with the public and without allowing the public any opportunity to bring the merits of their case to court before val-

ued ecosystems are destroyed".

This group of local writers is trying to capture the story of the Bluffs campaign through a collection of personal stories intended not only to entertain, but also to educate. Stay tuned ...

## Looking Back.... at the History of Stuffing

### By The Urban Chef™

Depending on what century you were born, you may have called it farce, dressing or good ole stuffing. Stuffing dates back as early as the first traceable cookbook. The Roman Cookbook, Apicius De Re Coquinaria, contains recipes for stuffed chicken, rabbit and pig. If you are from the middle ages, you would have referred to stuffing as 'farce'. The English upper crust, of the 1800's, called it 'dressing' and for us it's just 'stuffing'. There is no historical evidence stuffing was served at the first Thanksgiving but writings of pilgrims spoke of stuffing a variety of birds. In 1972, Stove Top introduced boxed stuffing and now sells almost 60 million boxes every Thanksgiving. Maybe we can reduce that number by a few. Here is a contribution for this year.

#### The Urban Chef™ Hazelnut -Orange Stuffing

1 lb	ground pork sausage
1 cup	chopped shallots
1 cup	chopped celery
1 tbsp	Herbes de Provence
1	minced large garlic clove
1 tsp	each salt and pepper
1 tbsp	dried thyme
1 tbsp	poultry seasoning
12-13 cups	day-old cubed bread, cut up day before and leave out uncovered
2 cups	toasted sliced hazelnuts/filberts
1 cup	dried currants
½ cup	dried blueberries or cranberries
½ cup	chicken stock
¼ cup	sherry or red wine or Madeira Wine
1	grated rind of one whole orange

1. Over medium heat, cook the sausage breaking up the meat so it is crumbly. While cooking, add the shallots, celery, Herbes de Provence and garlic. Cook until the meat is no longer pink in colour.

2. In a bowl big enough for everything, combine the remaining ingredients with the sausage mixture.

3. Taste the stuffing to adjust the seasoning.

Cook's Note: this stuffing can be made 2 days ahead and kept in the fridge until you are ready to stuff your turkey.

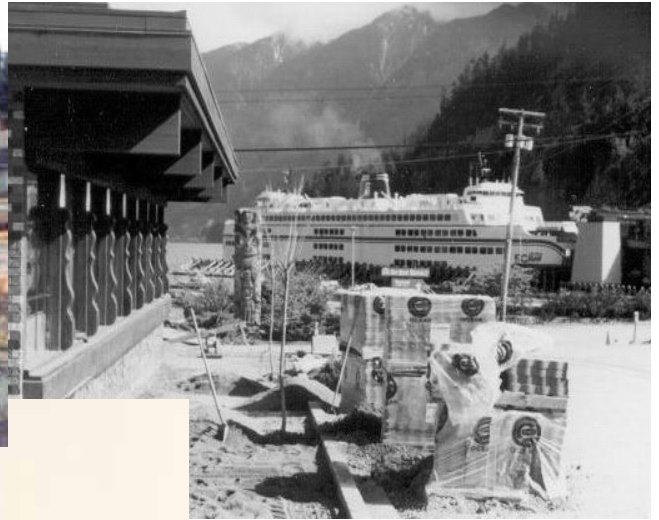
